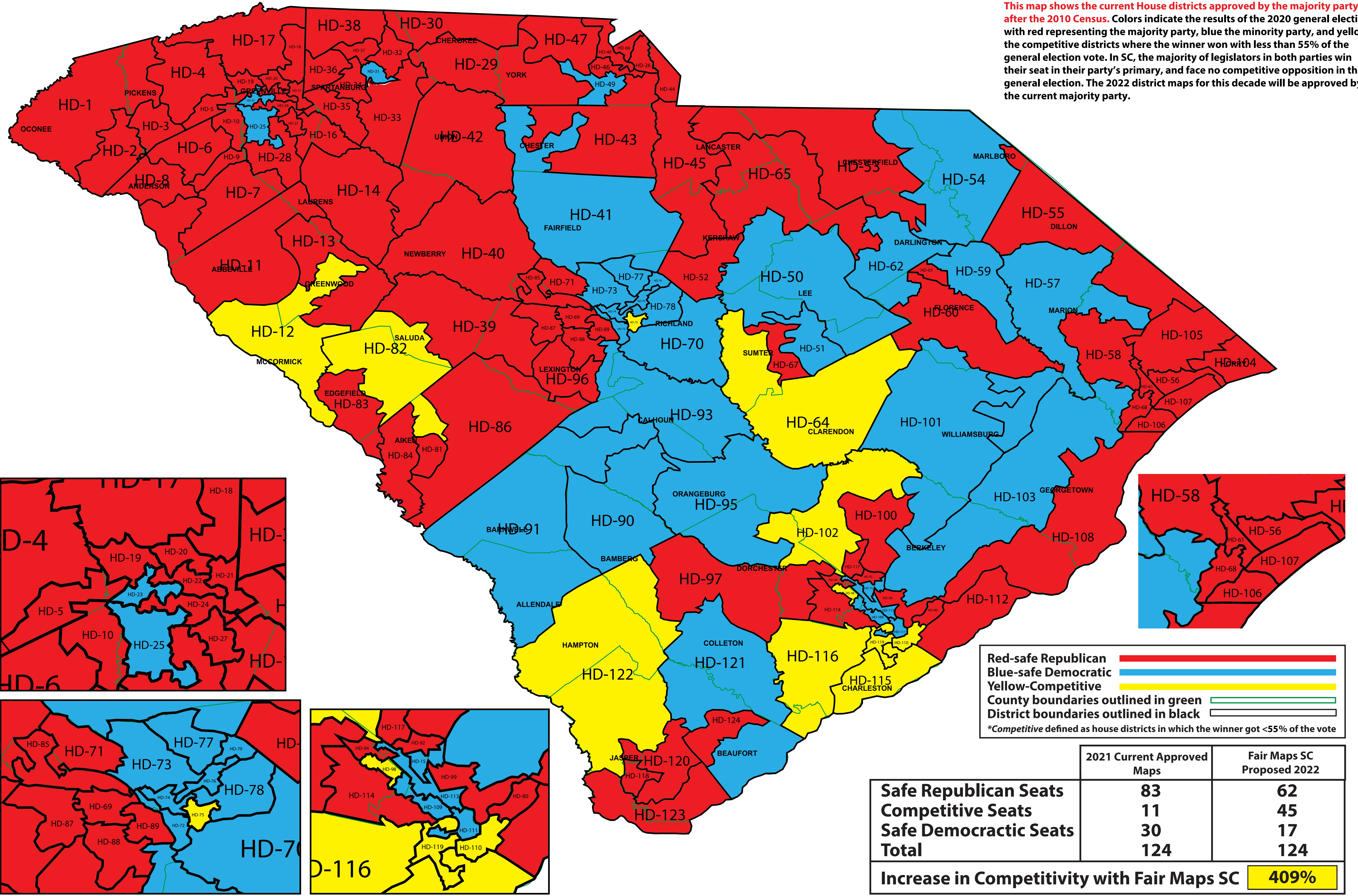
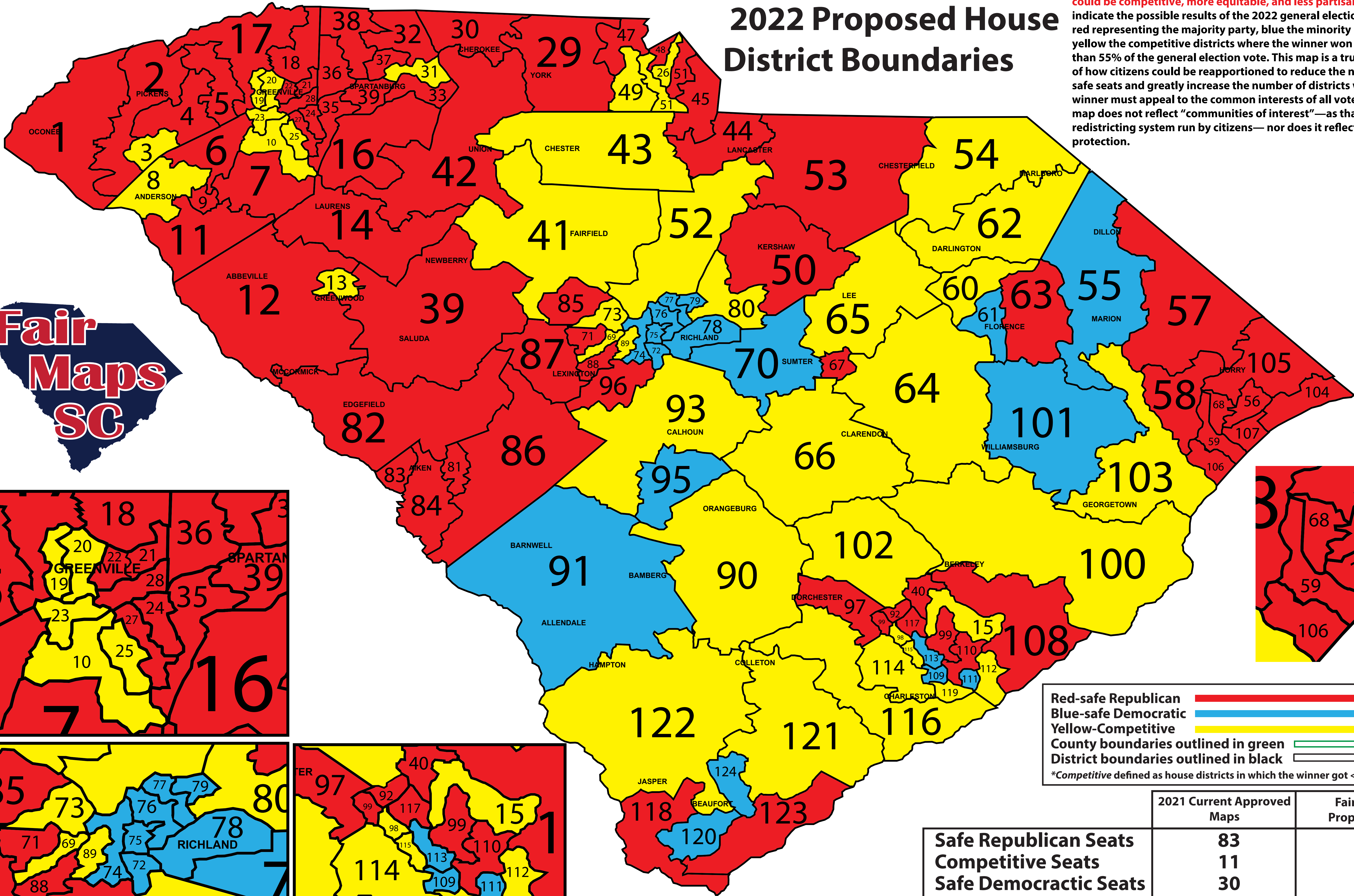
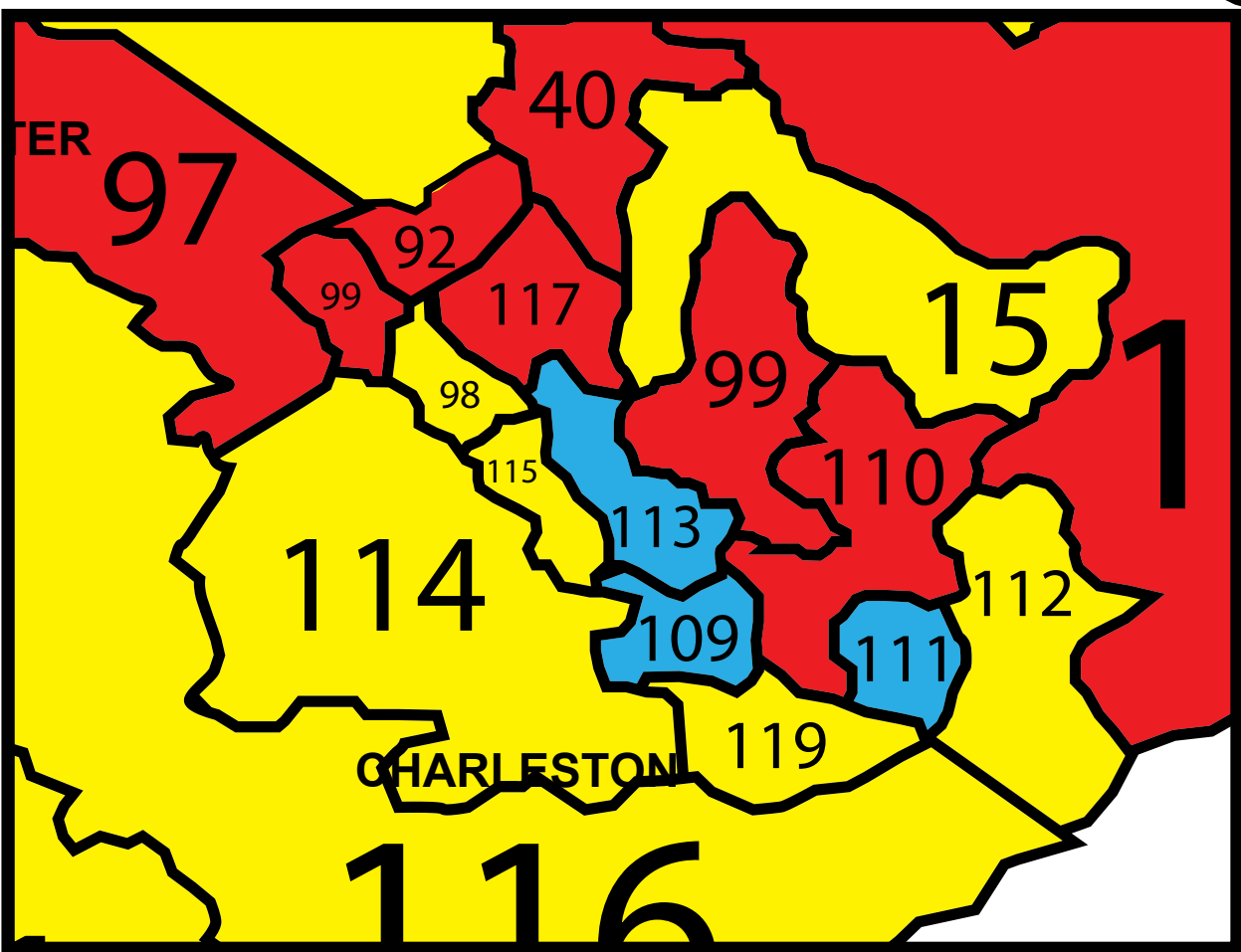
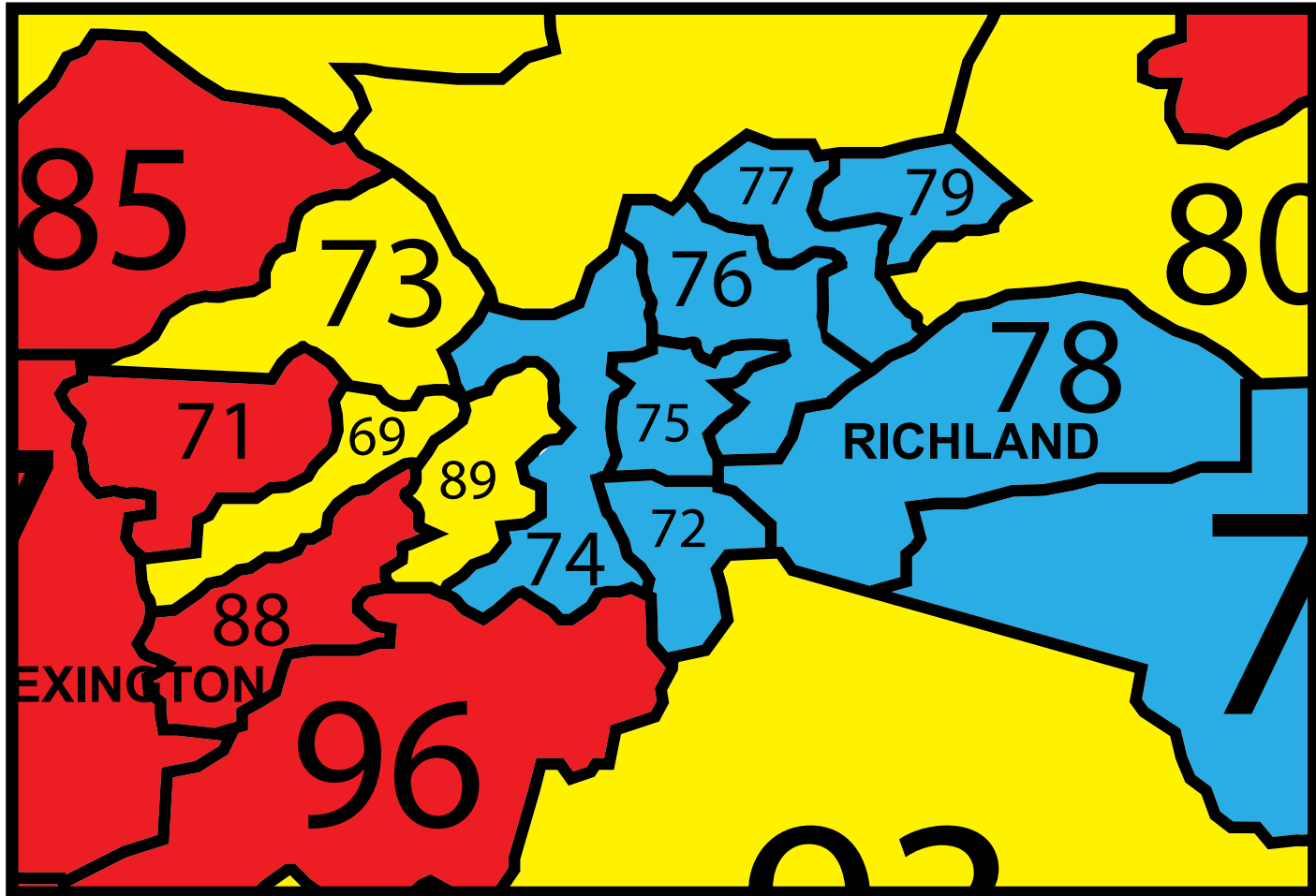
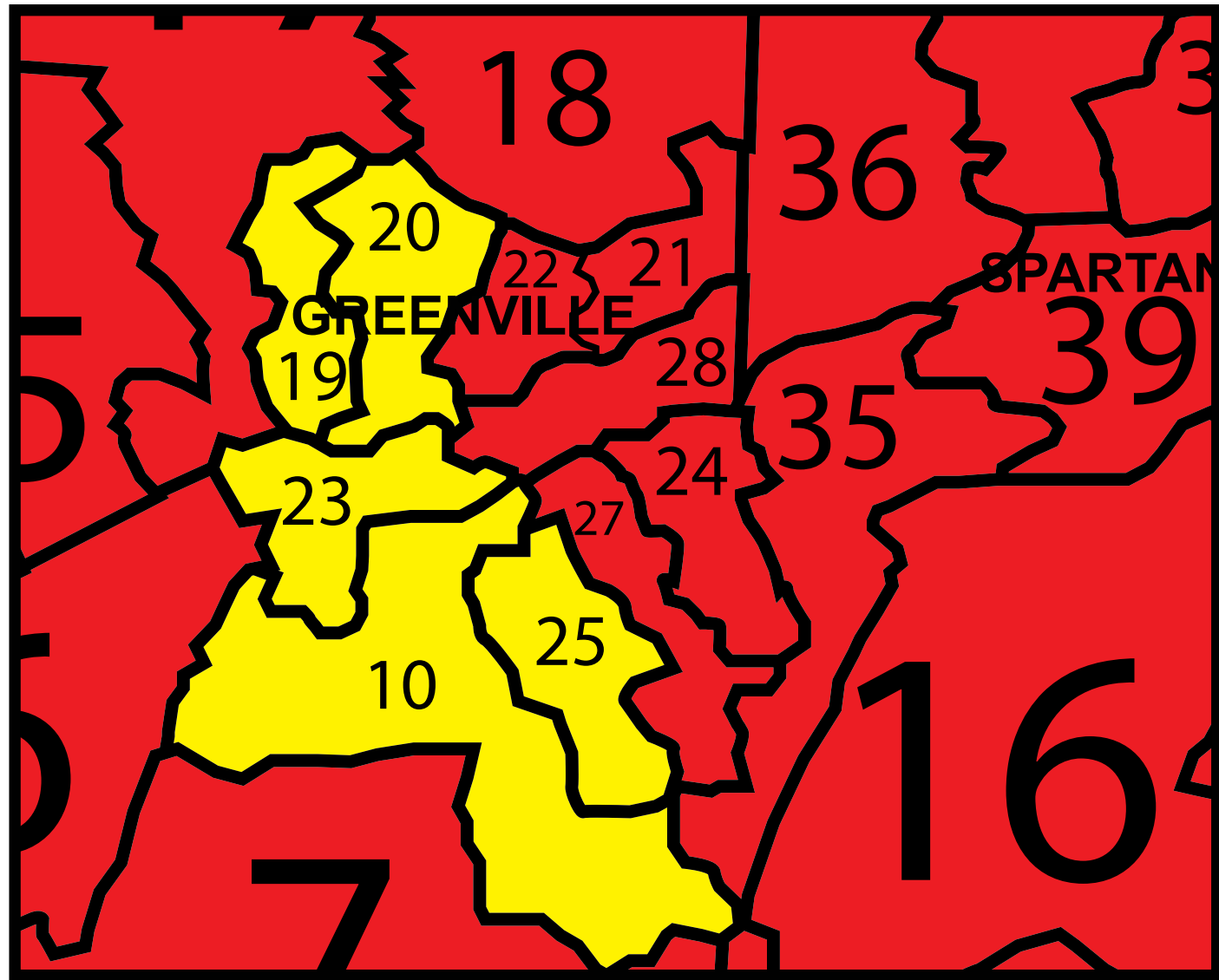


This map shows the current House districts approved by the majority party after the 2010 Census. Colors indicate the results of the 2020 general election, with red representing the majority party, blue the minority party, and yellow the competitive districts where the winner won with less than 55% of the general election vote. In SC, the majority of legislators in both parties win their seat in their party's primary, and face no competitive opposition in the general election. The 2022 district maps for this decade will be approved by the current majority party.



2022 Proposed House District Boundaries

This proposed Fair Map shows how House districts for the 2020s could be competitive, more equitable, and less partisan. Colors indicate the possible results of the 2022 general election, with red representing the majority party, blue the minority party, and yellow the competitive districts where the winner won with less than 55% of the general election vote. This map is a true representation of how citizens could be reapportioned to reduce the number of safe seats and greatly increase the number of districts where the winner must appeal to the common interests of all voters to win. This map does not reflect “communities of interest”—as that would require a redistricting system run by citizens—nor does it reflect incumbency protection.
